Sir!

I send myself off, earliest opportunity, but this afford time I had the pleasure of receiving your letter from Mr Fisher.

I beg leave in the first place to assure you that I shall be most happy at all times in endeavoring to procure information on such Botanical subjects as may interest you: I have at the same time to regret that I can add so very little to what you already know of Mauritia: specimens of the specimen in the Linnean Herbarium I know nothing; but a request addressed by Sir Joseph Banks to Sir James Smith has procured the enclosed fragment, & sir James states to be "one spike, 4 or 5 miserable spikes of the only specimen" in his collection. ~~which~~ having been once preserved is spent so much changed and so extremely brittle that it may possibly be reduced to a powder before it reaches you? and even if this should not

happens to it is but little calculated to give  
any information whatever. The business however  
of the Museum will serve at least to confirm you  
in your intention of adopting for your Morochi  
the Linnean name Mauritia as no confusion  
can result from it even if they should be different  
the Linnean genus being connected with no other  
knowledge whatever. Your conjecture respecting  
the origin of Linne's name for the genus appears  
to me extremely probable the colonial name  
Mauritius-Boon with which Linne had his specimen  
from Surinam being most likely compounded of the  
native Morochi or some very similar word & the  
Dutch Boon. No additional information however  
was to be obtained on this subject from the American  
manuscripts. Your description of the male  
flowers of Morochi agrees very well with that of  
Mauritia unless as you have no doubt remarked  
in the single circumstance of your plant having  
Hammia instead which ~~is~~ is certainly rarer than  
unusual occurring in the male of a floriferous plant  
you are perhaps not aware of there being a  
figure of the fruit of Peltia from Guyana  
in Cas. Bot. p. 25. which in all probability is  
that of Beckie & consequently of your Morochi

I rejoice to learn both from your letter &<sup>2</sup>  
more recently still from the Prospectus of the  
work, that your Nova Genera et species Plant.  
is likely so soon to appear. I am very anxious  
to see the first part in particular as containing  
two genera of plants Graminea & Araceæ to  
which I have paid some attention. With respect  
to the former of which your letter led me to expect  
material improvements in arrangement.

It is most gratifying to me to have obtained for  
my botanical epoch your approbation for that  
of several of the most eminent botanists of France  
and especially to have received so distinguished  
an honour as that of learning the Institut  
have done me in electing me a corresponding  
member. Of this however it is perhaps better  
to observe that I have received no official  
intimation.

It was with great pleasure that I learned that  
my constant friend Mr Hooker was in possession  
of your valuable Cryptogamic collection in  
the publication of which I have no doubt he  
will exhibit his usual accuracy & give you  
consequently complete satisfaction. Yours
